 - Developed by UNESCO (UN Educations, Science & Cultural Organization)



OCEAN POLICY COULD:



- Change the way our oceans are utilized for energy development, commerce & recreation
- Give one federal office full authority over the uses of our nation's oceans
- Give federal government authority to regulate activities in state waters and onshore that are deemed to potentially impact oceans and their ecosystems.



POTENTIAL ISSUES





- Limitation of discretionary authority of executive department/agency heads without a clear basis in statutory authority
- Ecosystem-based Management Approach potential impacts all areas
- State's rights/sovereignty issues
- Lack of input from commercial/recreational interests & Administrative Procedure Act concerns going forward regarding public input in policy development & implementation
- Need to preserve multiple use management policy
- Application of precautionary principle
- Confusion/cost resulting from adding new layer of bureaucracy (Clean Water/Air Acts, CZMA, Magnuson-Stevens Act, OCSLA)
- Likely impacts on commercial/recreational activities
- Establishment of potentially political regional planning bodies







- Executive action establishing a national ocean policy and appointing a National
 Ocean Council reporting to the White House is expected within 30 days
- Final document expected to adopt the Task Force's interim recommendations by combining the Interim Report and Interim Framework
- Task Force to conduct regional meetings following the policy announcement



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GOVERNING STRUCTURE



- National Ocean Council (NOC), co-chaired by Chair of White House Council on Environmental Quality and Director of the White House Office of Science & Technology Policy, would be responsible for developing & implementing national policy and certifying national consistency of regional CMSPs
- NOC would develop regional planning bodies that would develop CMSPs for 9 regional planning areas, subject to review and approval of NOC
- Regional conflicts and disputes would be resolved at national level by NOC, and if necessary, by the President
- Bottom Line: White House will control NOC
